

Golf Course Safety

Winter, Foggy and Misty conditions

At this time of year the course can become very wet and frosty.

For this reason sometimes tee mats have to be introduced to preserve our tees.

These mats can be slippery at times so please take extra care.

At all times please take care when accessing raised areas. Our green staff has marked out any areas that may be particularly wet or slippery so please pay attention and obey these markings.

Temporary condition

Please take extra care walking to the 1st Tee, the access route to the Bridge and the Bridge itself. Works are in place to rectify issues we have with the slip hazards some members have encountered. If you have any doubt while utilizing this route, please use the alternative access to the 1st Tee by using the access path to the lower car park and the Buggy Bridge.

Make sure the footwear you use is suitable and the spikes are in good condition.

Should you come across any spots that you feel are slippery but haven't been marked out, please let us know in the Pro Shop before you leave for the day.

Foggy / Misty conditions

Fog and Mist can come and go at any time on the course particularly in the winter.

If you cannot see the white post at the back of the eighteenth Green from the car park before starting your round of golf then the Board has stated you should not start your round until you can.

If however you have started a round and conditions deteriorate it is your responsibility to judge whether or not it is safe to continue.

If you decide to continue you must make sure the players in front are a safe distance away before playing a shot.

If you cannot see if it is fully clear then shout **is the fairway / green Clear** (name whichever fairway green you are playing to i.e. "is the 4th Green clear")

To help players following, shout back when you have cleared the fairway / green. i.e. "3rd Fairway Clear".

Remember it is your responsibility to keep fellow players safe in these conditions.

Anyone playing the course when advised not to does so entirely at their own risk
